BC Autism Assessment Network (BCAAN)

BCAAN Autism Assessment

BCAAN provides diagnostic assessments for children and youth (to age 19 years) with suspected Autism Spectrum Disorder, and accepts referrals from all physicians.

Asante Centre

Assessments for Individuals with Developmental Delays

The Asante Centre works with a variety of referral streams including options for:

- Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD)
- Complex developmental conditions from a range of stressors
- Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD); and
- Separate assessments for comprehensive psychology, medical, speech-language, and/or occupational therapy needs.

The Assante Centre has locations in Maple Ridge and Surrey, and virtual visits may be available. The Asante Centre is able to provide referral options for both publicly- or privately-funded services.

Clinicians who are not part of BCAAN can also assess and diagnose children but they must follow the *Ministry of Health Standards and Guidelines for the Assessment and Diagnosis of Young Children with Autism Spectrum Disorder in British Columbia (2003)* in order for the family to be eligible for Autism Funding from the province.

Complex Developmental Behavioural Conditions Assessment

Diagnostic Assessment through the CDBC and BCAAN Network

These diagnostic assessment services are intended for children and youth (ages 0-19 years) who have significant difficulties in multiple areas of functioning, including those with known or suspected history of exposure to substances with neurodevelopmental effects. Referral from pediatricians or child psychiatrists is required (with exceptions based on access). CDBC programs and BCAAN services are regionally coordinated and use a common referral form.

SPECIALIZED PRIMARY CARE AND PHYSICIAN CONSULTATION – ASANTE CENTRE

Family physicians with additional training in developmental diversities see patients and build understanding of their unique healthcare needs. Physicians are available for ongoing service as the person’s general practitioner, as well as consultation with community general practitioners to enhance patient care across BC.
